For example, while Betty taught bread making and sewing, Jim was busy teaching them how to build and use pit silos to produce and store supplies that could keep the livestock healthy even in the dry season. They operated on the theory that helping people to help themselves, while integrating the traditional practices of the Chadian people with proven modern agricultural practices, was the route to successful change. And the Diamonds emerged as changed as the people they were sent to help.

It's the story "They" don't want you to read. Though, to be fair, "They" are probably right about this one. To quote the Bible, "Learning the truth can be like loosening a necktie, only to realize it was the only thing keeping your head attached." No, don't put the book back on the shelf -- it is now your duty to purchase it to prevent others from reading it. Yes, it works with e-books, too, I don't have time to explain how. While investigating a fairly straightforward case of a shape-shifting interdimensional child predator, Dave, John and Amy realized there might actually be something weird going on. Together, they navigate a diabolically convoluted maze of illusions, lies, and their own incompetence in an attempt to uncover a terrible truth they -- like you -- would be better off not knowing. Your first impulse will be to think that a story this gruesome -- and, to be frank, stupid -- cannot possibly be true. That is precisely the reaction "They" are hoping for.
